4-H Camp Offers Creative and Educational Experiences

The Oklahoma 4-H Program has long been known for providing youth with a wide variety of educational experiences.

Attending a 4-H camp is no different. Camping has been proven to be an effective teaching tool for 4-H boys and girls, said Jeff Sallee, Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Service assistant Extension Specialist, 4-H and Youth Development.

"For many 4-H'ers, attending camp is their first chance to be away from home," Sallee said. "It's like a vacation from home, parents, siblings and everything they are used to. Camp is a fun experience where kids learn new things. Camp can mean growing up and crossing one of those boundaries that is the difference between childhood and a step toward independence. Youth also experience some activities that they'll get to do later on in 4-H."

Every summer counties across Oklahoma offer some sort of 4-H camp. Some counties may team up with one or two other counties. This situation is a great way for 4-H'ers to meet other kids from around their county, as well as neighboring counties.

Charles Cox, state 4-H program leader, said attending camp has many merits.

"There is real merit for a 4-H'er to attend camp outside of his or her own county," Cox said. "Kids want to explore. Loading up on a bus and going away as a group is a healthy thing. It helps kids develop independence. Camp also is a great 'leveler.' All campers are on the same level. It gives 4-H'ers the chance to really be themselves without

the pressure of being who their friends think they should be."

Not only do kids learn about new things and develop new friendships, summer camp provides them with an opportunity to create memories that last a lifetime.

"Every child needs the opportunity to grow, make new friends and stretch the boundaries of their everyday lives," Sallee said. "Camp may not necessarily be a life-changing experience, but it can be one that kids will look back on fondly."

Summer camp is not just for the younger campers. Most 4-H camps around the state use Teen Leaders as camp counselors.

"These counselors are usually at least 14 years old. They befriend the campers and keep everyone on track for their activities," Sallee said. "But the neat thing about the counselors is that they learn what it's like to be a role model. The campers see the counselors as the 'cool' older 4-H'ers, and it's a great opportunity for the counselor to build upon the responsibility of being a role model."

4-H camps also help motivate youth to stay involved in 4-H. Many 4-H'ers look back on their experience as a camper and what a big influence their teen counselor was. These 4-H'ers want the same opportunity to be a positive influence on the younger club members by serving as counselors themselves.

"4-H camp is so much more than going away from home," Sallee said. "Camp truly has value and it's an experience all 4-H'ers should have. It's a chance for simplified living and it's an environment where creative learning can take place in the great outdoors."

Pressures Are Just Temptations In Disguise

According to a survey of American workers, more than half admit they were pressured to do something unethical or illegal in the workplace in the previous year. It's likely that at least as many were pressured to lie, break promises or dodge responsibilities in their personal lives.

Can we really expect people do the right thing when there's so much pressure to do otherwise? Youngsters feeling pressure to get good grades cheat on exams while their parents cut moral corners on the job because of financial pressures. So, if we want more ethical people we have two choices: find a way to eliminate pressure or develop the strength of character to deal with it.

Let's be clear: pressures are just temptations in disguise. We call them pressures to get ourselves off the hook. You see, we all know that a test of our character is whether we resist and overcome temptations. It somehow seems more acceptable to give in to pressure. Can you imagine telling your father, a teacher or a boss that you lied or cheated because you were tempted?

We must resist the temptation to treat "pressures" as a satisfactory justification for ethical shortcuts. Blaming wrongdoings on pressure is simply an excuse. Pressures, temptations – call them what you will -- are part of life. Sure we should reduce temptations where we can, but what we really need is a concerted effort to strengthen our moral willpower to resist pressures, to do the right thing even when it costs more than we want to pay.


